tion, specifically reading and writing abilities, and says that although she only attended Salisbury University for two years that the media writing classes she took have been a huge help.

Her writing skills come into play daily when recording commercials. The scripts come from sales people and look fine on paper but when spoken can often sound cold and stiff and it is up to her to re-write or improvise small changes so that the wording sounds more natural.

Another example of her commitment to reading and writing is work with a reading program. Czyz has been participating in the Read-a-Latte Café program that has been going on in Worcester and Wicomico County.

The program features local public figures who speak at middle schools and explain to students how reading is important in their jobs.

Even with working six days a week as a DJ and doing community events, Czyz still makes time for Mind Control. In the band, she is joined with her sister, Brianna, who plays bass and does backup vocals, her father, Bryan, who does guitar, and Ryan Peters, who plays drums.

Mind Control released a CD less than a month ago and three of the songs have been chosen for movie soundtracks. The first two songs, "Take It Away" and "Sorry" can be heard on Lions Gate's direct to DVD release, "Ghostwatcher 2," which comes out next month. The third song will be featured in a film coming out sometime in 2006.

Since a child, Czyz has always loved singing and first got the idea of being in a band in the 1990s when Hanson came out. "Like everyone, we thought Hanson was three sisters and thought it was cool because if they can make it as a family then why can't me and my two sisters?" Czyz said.

Growing up, Czyz and her sisters would be driven to school by their father and on the way listen to Metallica, Pantera, Rush, and that whole vein of rock music. At the time, the girls hated it, but they credit it now for preparing them for their future.

"As a kid I was always scared to sing in front of people and I'd always do it at home and my dad would play the guitar. So I'd come home and he'd be jamming and I'd want to jam with him so he bought me a PA system to sing with him. My younger sister, Brianna, was like 'I wanna jam, too!' So we got her a bass and she taught herself how to play. Later my dad found a drummer and he came over just to jam with us and before I knew it we were doing shows," Czyz said.

Tonight, Mind Control will be playing in Dewey Beach, Del., for the annual music festival. They will be on stage at the Bottle and Cork at 7 p.m. and their CD can be purchased from Barnes and Noble in Salisbury or online at www.mindcontrolmusic.com.
